

Luggage Guide

There are luggage restrictions in place on light aircraft transfers. Strict luggage restrictions for the following reasons:

- Light aircraft are designed with a maximum bodyweight and luggage weight allowance in mind.
- Light aircraft have physical space restrictions that have to be taken into account for obvious safety reasons.
- Most airfields are over 4,000 ft above sea level and are located in the tropics. These conditions limit the carrying capacities of the aircraft operating in these regions.

Suggested Packing List

Please find herewith a list of items which should be used as a guideline whilst planning a safari.

- Soft bags with a rigid structure at the base – including wheels and/or a collapsible handle – will be accepted. Alternatively, standard soft duffel/tog type bags.
- The maximum dimensions of all bags which can be accommodated are as follows: 30 cm (11.8 inches) wide x 35 cm (13.8 inches) high and 70 cm (27.5 inches) long.
- The maximum permissible luggage allowance when travelling on a seat rate basis, including carry-on hand luggage and camera equipment, is restricted to 20 kg (44 lb) per person.
- The dimensions of all bags are firmly restricted to the following: 25 cm (10 inches) wide x 30 cm (12 inches) high.
- Only soft (duffel) bags will be accepted. The rule of thumb for this is a bag soft enough for you to easily manipulate its shape. Hard suitcases cannot be accepted, as it is not possible to physically fit them into the aircraft. This includes camera equipment and hand luggage. All luggage must be able to fit into the belly pods of the aircraft.
- No rigid structures, frames or wheels are allowed on or alongside luggage.
- The pilot reserves the right to include extra passengers or deny passengers and/or luggage on the flight if he believes that safety could be compromised due to weight.
